## Virtual Worship

With the closing of St. Mark's worship services and gatherings on Saturday, March 14, we entered a new chapter of our congregation's life together where we gather online since we cannot be together in person. As of press-time, we have had two Lenten Wednesday and two Sunday virtual worship services. Many thanks to Kinna for becoming our "Zoom guru" and helping many of us with our first experiences in using this online meeting tool.

Given the guidelines from the Office of the Bishop in the Rocky Mountain Synod for ELCA churches in our synod to close through at least May 10, plus government "Safer at Home" orders through at least part if not all of April, we are planning for more virtual worship services for Holy Week, Easter, and other Sundays in April and May. Those who have provided their email to the church office will receive an email with information on each specific virtual worship service. ### Palms for Palm Sunday

Our palms order arrived, so members who wish to have a few palms for use at home as part of our virtual worship service at 10 a.m. on Palm Sunday, April 5 may pick up a small bunch from the church on Friday, April 3 between 11 a.m.–1 p.m. *Please contact the church office to make other arrangements if you are not able to drive by during those hours.*

### A Brief Guide to Joining Our Sunday Virtual Worship on Zoom:

On either your computer or your Internet-enabled device (i.e., smartphone or tablet), go to [zoom.com](https://zoom.com). You can sign up for a free account but you are not obligated to. If prompted to download a software app, accept and allow it to download and install before you open it. If prompted, enter Meeting ID# 389 867 134 to be taken to our Sunday Virtual Worship meeting. This will be the same ID# for each Sunday through May 3, 2020 with the worship to begin at 10 a.m. MDT.

Those who do not have Internet connection can also listen in by calling one of a number of long-distance phone numbers, such as 1-346-248-7799 (Houston) or 1-669-900-6833 (San Jose); enter the meeting ID# when prompted to be join the meeting.

# From the Desk of Pastor Ken Thurow

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## A Lot of Things Used to be ROUTINE!

Do you remember routines? Well, of course we still have an abundance of routines, but I've been encountering a lot of disrupted routines. Those of you who were at worship (via ZOOM) on Sunday are aware of my embarrassing liturgical goof. I realized later that liturgy involves not only responses and texts, but that those things are connected to space and movement, as from altar to my chancel seat to pulpit and communion rail. On Sunday I realized how connected liturgy is to movement – it used to be routine!

The coronavirus/COVID-19 crisis is extremely serious. The U.S., with about 5% of the world's population, has above 20% of the world's cases, and nearly 10% of the deaths. The measures to control the spread are necessarily stringent – “social distancing,” businesses and places of public gathering closed for an indefinite period, stay at home, shop online or carry-out, avoid unnecessary travel. It is a crisis that has brought grief to people we know. We pray for comfort for the victims and for continued health for ourselves and loved ones.

The coronavirus has meant more time at home (good), less time in traffic (also good), but also physical distancing (not good), more time connecting by means of technology (mixed)—which seems efficient and yet feels more demanding and stressful than just old-fashioned talking (not good). Okay, I know my age gets into my views of technology, so let's just stick with that thought of routines interrupted; such things as buying groceries, connecting with friends, a stop at Starbucks, eating out for lunch and dinner, and – of course – CHURCH!

But I've always been fond of a line in the hymn “Once to Every Man and Nation.” The line is, “new occasions teach new duties.” Our lives are always lived in response to specific situations. Many of us have moved from the area of our childhood, most of our ancestors left homelands, Israelites lived in Exile in Babylon, Hebrews left Egypt and spent years in the wilderness. It's an old story. At this time we may be waiting for the crisis to end and routines to return, but they may not, not in the same way. But whatever the course of this crisis, the church will still gather for worship, faith will live on, and promises of God will not fail.

To be sure, this Holy Week, this Easter will be unlike any we have experienced, but even now we will worship, remembering our Lord's Passion and rejoicing at his

Resurrection. We will hear the gospel and will celebrate Holy Communion in a way we have never known before. But be sure of this, if God can be with the church throughout the world, God can certainly be with the church in and around Aurora! That is YOU, people of St. Mark's, people of the cross, people of new life and hope. The good news and the meal are FOR YOU!

## Holy Communion

After a Zoom meeting hosted by the Rocky Mountain Synod with more than 100 pastors participating, and after review by St. Mark's Church Council, we have decided to again include the Sacrament of Holy Communion in our Sunday services, as well as on Maundy Thursday. The pastors who took part in the Synod conversation hold a variety of views, including the view held by a good number that technology does create community where people are gathered in a live service, making celebration of the Sacrament appropriate.

**The PROCEDURE:** Members who wish to receive the Sacrament must have the same elements used at the church: bread and either wine or grape juice. The bread may be of any type, made with any kind of grain, unleavened or leavened, and would include such items as crackers or tortillas. The “beverage,” however, must be either wine or grape juice – not apple, tomato, etc. The elements should be made ready in your home before worship.

We will speak the Communion liturgy, using either the Eucharistic Prayer or the simple “Words of Institution.” After the Lord's Prayer the pastor will direct you to receive the Sacrament. Members of couples or families may serve each other; persons in one-person households may serve themselves. Though this might seem strange, it was standard practice for pastors to serve themselves back in the time when I was first ordained when most Lutheran worship did not include lay leadership (such as Assisting Ministers or Lectors).

If you do not have the elements, refrain from substitution, but wait until you have the elements or let the Church Office know that you need them. As we repeat again and again, the body and blood of Christ, under forms of bread and wine, are FOR YOU! We are happy to again be able to offer the Sacrament.

Peace and healing to all! I'm sitting at my desk at home, staring out the window, longing for an adventure. At the same time, I remind myself that we are in the "Holy Saturday" of this pandemic, waiting for the resurrection, the new life post pandemic. I pray everyone is staying home and staying safe and well. I grieve with you at the loss of physical connection with family and friends. A couple of my friends with immunodeficiency disorders have to work to survive and are terrified of getting COVID-19, and I have a friend who just contracted the virus. It's a scary time, a time for the younger healthy folks to practice empathy for the most vulnerable, a time for physical distancing, a time for listening to the Holy Spirit as she speaks us into a new reality of being community.

OHANA Youth has begun this journey by purchasing an account for a video conference tool called Zoom, which we have also shared with the congregation to be able to worship online together. Our youth have met at least twice a week over Zoom since our weekend camp was canceled March 13–15 due to social distancing. They have loved being able to see their friends, play virtual games, and check-in through these trying times. We are able to do OHANA Chapel (Sunday School) and Affirmation of Baptism class over Zoom as well. One Sunday, we were on Zoom together for over three hours, when I finally had to kick them off so I could go do other things. I encourage them to stay connected though, and use other free video conferencing tools.



We appreciate your prayers for all of our families, as well as all of St. Mark's community, Colorado, the US, and the world as we navigate these new and hard times. I have some families who are struggling more than others with financial difficulties, not being able to work, and a dad with an immunodeficiency disorder. There hasn't been an immediate need that I can respond to yet, but I am checking in with them weekly. I hope we are all taking time to connect with our neighbors, friends, family, and St. Mark's community so we can continue to be a beacon of hope for one another.

# Generosity and Our Life Together

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Beloved in the Rocky Mountain Synod,

**ELCA Presiding Bishop, Elizabeth Eaton, said at our Churchwide Assembly in August: “We are not a dying church. We are a changing church.” The threat of COVID-19 has pushed the church into an unsettling place of change over the last several weeks.** Suddenly, we understand that “church” does not mean “building.” It means people. And we are connecting in ways never before imagined.

Because of COVID-19, we are grieving what we treasure most as church: gathering together as the embodied people of God, who are the hands and feet and voices of Christ, made alive in the world. We long for the time when we can gather together again to sing, and to pray, and to embrace as people who genuinely greet one another with the peace and presence of Christ.

Yet this we already know: that the church remains vital and alive, even while our buildings are silent. We are, all the more, *better together*.

As people of faith, what might it mean to practice generosity in the midst of a pandemic? As a synod team, we acknowledge that the uncertainty of this time may impact your household’s capacity to give financially to your congregation. We also know the ministries in our synod will continue and need our continued support. Our Rocky Mountain Synod Executive Committee has made a commitment to continuing their generosity through regular giving to their congregation. Monetary giving is one of many ways to practice generosity. Prayer, spiritual practice, and extending care to others in appropriate ways are all important expressions of faithful stewardship.

Indeed, ministry is continuing through your congregation in spite of the challenges posed by COVID-19. Your church and synod leaders are acting in faithful, innovative ways every day as they discern how best to support the needs of the community and the wider world. Your financial gifts make possible the important work that will continue happening through all three expressions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (congregations, synods and churchwide) as well as through an abundance of ministry partners. The Gospel is still being proclaimed in many and various ways during this pandemic.

Please identify one of the following means through which you can facilitate continued generosity at any level in your ministry context.

1. **Mail a check to your congregation on a consistent basis.**
2. **Contact your bank to set-up automatic financial giving that comes out of your banking account and is mailed to your congregation on a regular basis.**
3. **Connect with your church leaders and request that online giving be an option.**

We do not know how long the threat of COVID-19 will interfere with our ability to gather together in person. But we do know that Christ is present nevertheless: yesterday, today, and forever. As you live out these challenging times that are marked by grief for what has been, be gentle with yourself as you embrace the gifts of grace and gratitude that are already ours.

# Council Corner

## Council Highlights—March 10, 2020

President Gohl opened the meeting at 5:50 p.m. with a prayer. Pastor Ken was absent. Mary Katherine attended as a guest and Worship Chairperson.

Secretary, Treasurer, and Financial Secretary reports were reviewed and approved. Bill will look for a better quote for insurance on the church.

### Pastor's Report

Pastor Ken has been visiting and taking communion to our members on the “pastoral care” list. He asks council to think of where an unchanged future leads and where changes can be envisioned.

### Youth and Family Ministries

Council reviewed Kinna's printed report. She asked to host two youth groups from Other+Wise this summer at St. Mark's: 1. June 13–19 and 2. July 11–17. Council agreed to host both groups.

### New Business:

The funding for ESL classes has run out, leaving St. Mark's with a deficit of \$400. Aliria Bello has been offered continued use of church if she can find funding elsewhere.

A request to have a late summer wedding at St. Mark's was approved.

Request for Wompost to place a compost bin in our parking lot for neighborhood use was denied.

### President's Report

The door at the top of the education wing has been broken. Bids to replace it with a steel door and frame that will hold up better than the existing wooden door and frame are about \$4500. Ryan will ask some members of the congregation to help with replacement.

Roof repairs at the top of the stairs in the education wing have been completed. We are waiting for the bill.

Council discussed ways to address COVID-19 in our worship services and gatherings. Mary Katherine passed out a report on what churches can do to keep everyone safe. [**Note:** This was before services and gatherings were cancelled later in the week.]

Meeting ended with the Lord's Prayer.

# WORSHIP LIFE AT ST. MARK'S

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## April 2020

*All worship services in April will be "virtual" online services on Zoom. Sundays' meeting ID#389 867 134 will be the same each week; Maundy Thursday and Good Friday services' meeting IDs will be emailed once they are scheduled.*

### **Sunday, April 5, 2020 ~ Palm Sunday**

Today, we encounter the paradox that defines our faith: Jesus Christ is glorified king and humiliated servant. We too are full of paradox: like Peter, we fervently desire to follow Christ, but find ourselves afraid, denying God. We wave palms in celebration today as Christ comes into our midst, and we follow with trepidation as his path leads to death on the cross. Amid it all we are invited into this paradoxical promise of life through Christ's broken body and outpoured love in a meal of bread and wine. We begin this week that stands at the center of the church year, anticipating the completion of God's astounding work.

### **Maundy Thursday, April 9, 2020**

This evening our Lenten observance comes to an end, and we gather with Christians around the world to celebrate the Three Days of Jesus' death and resurrection. Tonight we remember Christ's last meal with his disciples, but the central focus is his commandment that we live out the promise embodied in this meal. As Jesus washed his disciples' feet, so we are called to give and receive love in humble service to one another. Formed into a new body in Christ through this holy meal, we are transformed by the mercy we have received and carry it into the world. Departing worship in solemn silence, we anticipate the coming days.

### **Good Friday, April 10, 2020**

Life and death stand side by side as we enter into Good Friday. In John's passion account, Jesus reveals the power and glory of God, even as he is put on trial and sentenced to death. Standing with the disciples at the foot of the cross, we pray for the whole world in the ancient bidding prayer, as Christ's death offers life to all. We gather in solemn devotion, but always with the promise that the tree around which we assemble is indeed a tree of life. We depart silently, and we anticipate the culmination of the Three Days in the Easter Vigil.

### **Sunday, April 12, 2020 ~ Easter**

This is the day the Lord has made! Christ is risen, and through him all creation is made new! Indeed, "God shows no partiality" (Acts 10:34): Christ's resurrection truly brings life to everyone. We sing hymns of praise, gather around sacred words, and proclaim God's faithfulness, power, and love in the feast of holy communion. With the women at the tomb, we are astonished, elated, and grateful. We depart with joy to proclaim the good news of God's endless love.

## Sunday, April 19, 2020 ~ Second Sunday of Easter

In today's gospel the risen Christ appears to the disciples and offers them the gift of peace. Even amid doubts and questions, we experience the resurrection in our Sunday gathering around word and meal, and in our everyday lives. Throughout the coming Sundays of Easter the first two readings will be from the Acts of the Apostles and the first letter of Peter. Even as the early Christians proclaimed the resurrection, we rejoice in the new birth and living hope we receive in baptism.

## Sunday, April 26, 2020 ~ Third Sunday of Easter

Today's gospel begins with two disciples walking to Emmaus, overcome with sadness, loss, and disappointment. They had hoped Jesus, who was crucified, would be the one to redeem Israel! Yet the risen Christ walks with them and then opens their eyes in the breaking of the bread. Each Sunday our hearts burn within us as the scriptures are proclaimed and Christ appears to us as bread is broken and wine is poured. The story of Emmaus becomes the pattern of our worship each Lord's day.
